EMS WEEK

During Emergency Medical Services Week (May 21-27, 2023), we recognized and thanked Rockland County Emergency Medical Services (EMS), made up of 14 Volunteer Basic Life Support (BLS) and 2 Advanced Life Support (ALS) agencies, for their dedication in providing day-to-day lifesaving services in our communities.

Rockland County EMS providers respond to more than 60,000 calls a year for emergency response service, 24 hours a day 365 days a year, to Rockland's 300,000 residents and visitors. With the assistance of the local police department's dispatch system, they are the unsung heroes who are quickly sent to your emergency.

This was the 49th EMS Week and this year's theme was **EMS: Where Emergency Care Begins**. With that in mind, please remember when you are out on the road, yield the right of way to emergency vehicles and vehicles with green lights. These are the responders who on their way to assist someone in need!

STROKE AWARENESS MONTH

When it comes to stroke, remember to **B.E. F.A.S.T.** in getting medical treatment if you have any of the following symptoms:

- B Balance is off
- E Eyes change in vision
- F Face drooping
- A Arm no control /numb
- S Speech change in speech and ability to talk clearly
- T Time is brain

There are two types of stroke. The most common type involves a clot that impedes blood flow to the brain, known as an ischemic stroke. The other type is a hemorrhagic stroke, which involves bleeding in the brain. Once a person comes to the ED with a possible stroke, they are immediately taken for a CT scan to see if there is bleeding in the brain. Once the type of stroke is known, doctors will know how to treat it. Remember the signs and symptoms of a stroke, and call 9-1-1 right away if you think someone might be having a stroke. Getting fast treatment is important to preventing death and disability.

TRAUMA AWARENESS MONTH

The American Trauma Society (ATS) and The Society of Trauma Nurses (STN) have come together in the development of the annual National Trauma Awareness



Month (NTAM) campaign. With a documented rise in motor vehicle crashes and fatalities throughout our nation, the theme **"Roadway Safety Is No Accident"** is both timely and appropriate for trauma centers to promote. Our roadways continue to become overcrowded, drivers are more distracted now than ever before, and safety hazards are growing, thus contributing to the rise in motor vehiclerelated injuries and deaths. Raising awareness and supporting prevention efforts is more important now than ever. This year's campaign focuses on five areas to focus prevention efforts including:

- Passenger Advocacy
- Distracted Driving
- Experience
- <u>Impairment</u>
- <u>Traffic Safety</u>





PARKINSONS WELLNESS PROJECT

Members of local organizations, including our very own Community Health and Wellness Department, were invited to see the colorful explosion of 4,000 tulip bulbs at the "Garden of Hope." Located near the entrance of Clover Stadium in Pomona, NY, this beautiful garden was created as a dedicated public space for meditation, reflection, and inspiration in bringing a cure for Parkinson's disease.

Parkinson's disease (PD) is a brain disorder that causes unintended or uncontrollable movements, such as shaking, stiffness, and difficulty with



balance and coordination. PD occurs when brain cells that make dopamine, a chemical that coordinates movement, stop working or die. Because PD can cause tremor, slowness, stiffness, and walking and balance problems, it is called a "movement disorder." But depression, memory problems, and other non-movement symptoms also can be part of Parkinson's. PD is a lifelong and progressive disease, which means that symptoms slowly worsen over time. The next time you head to see the New York Boulders, stop by the "Garden of Hope" and take in its natural beauty near the entrance of Clover Stadium.

MENTAL HEALTH AWARENESS MONTH

One in 5 Americans lives with the reality of a mental health condition every day. As an employee, it is important to increase awareness and reduce the stigma regarding mental health conditions in the workplace, and here is why:

- Depression is the leading cause of disability for people ages 15-44 in the United States.
- Even mild cases of depression or anxiety can impact employee turnover and performance.
- Depression is estimated to cause 400 million lost workdays each year.
- The workplace may be the only place where intervention can have an impact.

For many people, the stigma associated with mental health disorders is often a barrier to getting appropriate care. In the workplace, employees may be concerned about their co-workers' reactions or may feel a lack of support at work, preventing them from seeking assistance.

How Can You Help?

Know the signs of depression in the workplace. Look for changes in your co-worker's behavior which can include:

- Difficulty concentrating on tasks
- Lateness or absenteeism
- Feeling tired or fatigued
- Unusually tearful or emotional
- Irritability
- Avoidance of others/withdrawal
- Difficulty completing projects in a reasonable timeframe
- Increased errors

Start a Conversation

If you see something, say something.

- Ask your co-worker if he or she is ok. Tell them that they do not seem themselves lately and give them your concrete, objective observations of changes in their behavior or performance.
- Listen, but don't pry. If your co-worker wants to talk, try not to jump in with solutions. He or she will likely benefit from your listening ear. Be reassuring and non-judgmental. Keep in mind that sometimes less is more when it comes to sharing personal information.
- Provide support. Let your co-worker know that depression, or anxiety, is common and that there is help. Suggest contacting the EAP for confidential assistance with a professional counselor.
- Follow-up. Check-in with your co-worker to see how they are doing and if they have followed your recommendation to seek assistance.

A bite from an infected tick can cause Lyme Disease and other diseases, such as ehrlichiosis, babesiosis, anaplasmosis and powassan. These diseases are treatable with antibiotics but may be hard to diagnose. The most effective ways to protect yourself are through awareness and prevention.
